Grace Period: Shall continue to serve until a successor has been qualified.
(Gov. Code § 1302.)

Compensation: None, except actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of duty. (Gov. Code § 11009.)

Meeting
Frequency: Not stated in statute.

Bond: Not stated in statute.

Oath: Government Code §§ 1360 – 1363.

Duties: May establish separate classifications of written premiums for the purpose of equitable distribution but shall not include premiums from automobile or farm risks. (Ins. Code § 10094.)

FAIR EMPLOYMENT AND HOUSING COUNCIL

Purpose: Protect Californians from employment, housing, and public accommodation discrimination, and hate violence pursuant to the California Fair Employment and Housing Act, Unruh Rights Act, Disabled Persons Act, and Ralph Civil Rights Act.

Authority: Government Code § 12903.

Appointing Power: Governor (requires Senate confirmation)

Number: Seven (7)

Special
Considerations:

Qualifications: Director, Fair Employment and Housing serves as a nonvoting ex-officio member of the council. (Gov. Code § 12903.)

Term: Four (4) years*. (Gov. Code § 12903.)

* Appointments made on or after January 1, 2017, terms for four (4) of the members are four (4) years in length and the terms of three (3) of the members are two (2) years in length. After the terms of these initial appointments expire, members would be appointed to serve 4-year terms. (Gov. Code § 12903 (a)(1).)

Any member chosen to fill a vacancy shall be appointed for the unexpired term. (Gov. Code § 12903(1)(c).)

Term Limits: None stated in statute.

Grace Period: Sixty (60) days. (Gov. Code § 1774.)

Compensation: One hundred dollars (\$100), and for actual and necessary expenses accrued in the performance of duties. (Gov. Code § 12905.)

Meeting

Frequency: To meet at any place within the state and function in any office of the department. (Gov Code § 12935(a)(3).)

Bond: Not stated in statute.

Oath: Government Code §§ 1360 – 1363.

FAIR EMPLOYMENT AND HOUSING COUNCIL

Duties:

Adopt, promulgate, amend, and rescind suitable rules, regulations, and standards. (Gov. Code § 12935(a).)

Interpret, implement, and apply all provisions of the Fair Employment and Housing Act. (Gov. Code § 12935(a)(1).)

Create or provide technical assistance to any advisory agencies and conciliation councils, local or otherwise, as in its judgment will aid in effectuating the purposes of this part.
(Gov. Code § 12935(b).)

Hold hearings, issue publications, results of inquiries and research, and reports to the Governor and Legislature that, in its judgment, will tend to aid in the effectuating the purpose of this part, promote good will, cooperation and conciliation, and minimize or eliminate unlawful discrimination, or advance civil rights in the State of California. (Gov. Code § 12935(c).)

FAIR POLITICAL PRACTICES COMMISSION

Purpose: To fairly, effectively and efficiently enforce the provisions of the Political Reform Act.

Authority: Government Code §§ 83100 et seq.

Appointing Power: Governor – 2
*One (1) is the (full-time staff) Chairperson.
Attorney General – 1
Secretary of State – 1
Controller – 1

Number: Five (5)

Special Considerations: Governor's appointees shall not be members of the same political party. (Gov. Code § 83101.)

No more than three (3) members shall be of the same political party. (Gov. Code § 83101.)

Qualifications: Governor appoints the chairman and one (1) additional member of the Commission. (Gov. Code § 83101.)

Each member of the commission shall be an elector. No member of the commission, during his or her tenure, shall hold any other public offices, serve as an officer of any political party or partisan organization, participate in or contribute to an election campaign, or employ or be employed as a lobbyist nor, during his or her term of appointment, seek election to any other public office. (Gov. Code § 83105.)

The Attorney General, the Secretary of State and the Controller shall each appoint one (1) member of the Commission. (Gov. Code § 83102(a).)

If the Attorney General, the Secretary of State and the Controller are all members of the same political party, the chairman of the state central committee of any other political party with a registration of more than five hundred thousand may submit to the Controller a list of not less than five persons who are qualified and willing to be members of the Commission. The list shall be submitted not less than ten (10) days after the effective date of this chapter for the Controller's initial appointment, and not later than January 2 immediately prior to any subsequent appointment by the Controller. If the Controller receives one (1) or more lists pursuant

Purpose: The council's purposes are to establish fast-food restaurant minimum standards on wages, and develop fast food restaurant minimum standards on working hours, and other working conditions adequate to ensure and maintain the health, safety, and welfare of, and to supply the necessary cost of proper living to, fast food restaurant workers and to ensure and effect interagency coordination and prompt agency responses regarding issues affecting the health, safety, and employment of fast food restaurant workers. (Labor Code § 1475 (b)).

Authority: Labor Code § 1475 (a)(1-2)

Appointing Power: Governor – 7
Senate Committee on Rules – 1
Speaker of the Assembly – 1

In addition to the 9 voting members, the council shall include the following 2 nonvoting members:

One representative from the Department of Industrial Relations.

One representative from the Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development.

Number: Eleven (11)

Special Considerations:

Qualifications: Governor appoints seven (7): (Labor Code § 1475 (a)(3)) .

- Two representatives of the fast-food restaurant industry.
- Two representatives of fast-food restaurant franchisees or restaurant owners.
- Two representatives of fast-food restaurant employees.
- One unaffiliated member of the public who is not an owner, franchisee, officer, or employee in the fast-food industry; who is not an employee or officer of a labor organization or a member of a labor organization representing fast food restaurant employees; and who has not received income from the fast food industry or any labor organization for a period of two years prior to appointment.

Grace Period: Continues to serve until successor has qualified (Gov. Code § 1302.)

Compensation: Each member of the council shall receive one hundred dollars (\$100) for each day of their actual attendance at meetings of the council and other official business of the council, in addition to their actual necessary traveling expenses incurred in the performance of their duties as a member. (Labor Code § 1475 (a) (6)).

Meeting Frequency: Not stated in statute. All meetings of the council shall be subject to the Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act (Article 9 (commencing with Section 11120) of Chapter 1 of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code). (Labor Code § 1475 (a) (8)).

Bond: Not stated in statute.

Oath: Government Code §§ 1360 – 1363.

Duties: The council is charged with developing minimum fast-food restaurant employment standards, including, as appropriate, standards on wages, working conditions, and training, as are reasonably necessary or appropriate to protect and ensure the welfare, including the physical well-being and security, of fast-food workers or to otherwise meet the purposes of this section, subject to the limitations of subdivisions (e) and (f). In developing these standards, the council may take account of regional differences.

Authority: Business and Professions Code § 6510(b).

Appointing Power: Governor – 5
Senate Committee on Rules – 1
Speaker of the Assembly – 1

Number: Seven (7)

Qualifications: Governor: (Bus. & Prof. Code § 6511(d).)
• Two (2) public member members;
 ○ One (1) from a nonprofit organization advocating on behalf of the elderly;
 ○ One (1) probate court investigator;
• Three (3) licensees actively engaged as professional fiduciaries in this State. (Bus. & Prof. Code § 6511(a).)

Senate Committee on Rules appoints one (1) public member. (Bus. & Prof. Code § 6511(d).)

Speaker of the Assembly appoints one (1) public member. (Bus. & Prof. Code § 6511(d).)

Term: Four (4) years, and shall hold office until the appointment of his or her successor or until one (1) year shall have elapsed since the expiration of the term for which he or she was appointed, whichever first occurs. (Bus. & Prof. Code § 6511(b).)

CALIFORNIA FILM COMMISSION

Purpose: Works to enhance the climate in California by keeping film industry jobs and projects in the state.

Authority: Government Code § 14998.

Appointing Power: Governor – 13
Senate Committee on Rules – 4
Speaker of the Assembly – 4

Number: Twenty-six (26)

Special Considerations: No more than three (3) legislators from the same political party may be appointed to or serve on the commission at the same time.
(Gov. Code § 14998.2(b)(2).)

Qualifications: Governor appoints thirteen (13) members:
(Gov. Code § 14998.2(d)(1-7).)

- 1) One (1) shall be a person who is a member or employee of a union or guild of motion picture artists.
- 2) One (1) shall be a person who is a member or employee of a union or guild representing motion picture craftsmen, technicians, or photographers.
- 3) Two (2) shall be from major motion picture studios.
- 4) One (1) shall be a member of the city council or a member of the county board of supervisors of a city or a county with a population of at least two million people.
- 5) One (1) shall be a member of the city council or a member of the county board of supervisors of a city or a county with a population of less than two million people.
- 6) One (1) shall be an independent filmmaker that meets the following criteria:
 - Running time of at least 75 minutes
 - Is intended for commercial distribution to a motion picture theater, directly to the home video market, directly to television, or through the Internet.
 - Produced by a company that is not publicly traded and publicly traded companies do not own, directly or indirectly, more than 25 percent of the producing company.
- 7) One (1) shall be a member who is an independent commercial producer, or employee of a trade association representing independent commercial producers.
 - A producer who owns or is employed by a company that is principally engaged in the physical or digital production

of advertising content for advertisers, has control over the selection of production locations, deployment, or management of the production equipment, and directly employs the production crew as the person that has control over the hiring and firing of the crew for a commercial production. The company shall not be wholly or partly owned or operated by an advertising agency or an advertiser or be publicly traded. The company shall also not produce any production to which the recordkeeping requirements of Section 3357 of Title 18 of the United States Code apply.

8) Five (5) public members.

Members appointed by the Governor may include representatives of state and local government, motion picture development companies, employee and professional organizations composed of persons employed in the motion picture industry, and other appropriate members of this or related industries. (Gov. Code § 14998.2(a).)

Senate Committee on Rules shall appoint two (2) members. One (1) shall be a Senator and the other member may be a Senator as well. (Gov. Code § 14998.2(b)(1).)

Speaker of the Assembly shall appoint two (2) members. One (1) shall be a member of the Assembly and the other member may be an Assemblymember as well. (Gov. Code § 14998.2(b)(1).)

Legislative members shall serve as a voting member, and shall meet with, and participate in the activities of, the commission to the extent that participation is not incompatible with his or her position as a Member of the Legislature, but shall only serve in that capacity while concurrently serving as a Member of the Legislature. (Gov. Code § 14998.2(c).)

Ex officio Nonvoting members:

- Director of Transportation
- Director of Parks and Recreation
- Commissioner of the California Highway Patrol
- State Fire Marshal
- Director of the Film Commission

Term: All members, except legislators who are appointed by either the Senate Committee on Rules or by the Speaker of the Assembly,

FLEXIBLE ASSISTANCE FOR SURVIVORS ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Purpose: The Flexible Assistance for Survivors (FAS) pilot grant program is hereby established, to be administered by the Office of Emergency Services (OES), with the goal of improving safety, healing, and financial stability for survivors, and the loved ones of those violently injured or killed. FAS grants shall be made to qualifying community-based organizations pursuant to this chapter for the purpose of establishing assistance funds to distribute in direct cash assistance to survivors.

The OES shall establish an advisory committee that includes, without limitation, persons who have been impacted by violence, formerly incarcerated persons, and persons with direct experience in implementing supportive services for marginalized survivors. The committee shall provide guidance on developing an application, the program structure, and progress reports. (GC § 8699.01(a)).

Authority: GC § 8699.01 (c)

Appointing Power: Governor – 2
Senate Rules Committee – 2
Speaker of the Assembly – 2

Number: 6 members

Special Considerations: The advisory committee should include, without limitation, persons who have been impacted by violence, formerly incarcerated persons, and persons with direct experience in implementing supportive services for marginalized survivors. No member of the board appointed pursuant to subdivision (c) or (d) of Section 902 shall participate in any board action that involves himself or herself or any agricultural entity with which he or she is connected as a director, officer, or employee, or in which he or she has a financial interest in the decision within the meaning of Section 87103 of the Government Code. (Food & Agr. Code § 906(b).)

An appointee to the board shall not receive financial compensation from, or be employed by, a health care entity that is subject to the cost targets, an entity subject to cost and market impact reviews, or an exempted provider. An appointee's prohibited financial compensation and employment does not include employment by a health care entity solely as a tenured academic instructor with duties and compensation unrelated to the health care operations of the entity. Financial compensation does not include compensation received pursuant to a retirement plan. Financial compensation does not include clinical volunteer services if all of the following conditions are met:

1. The board member is a health care professional who was actively participating in that profession prior to appointment to the board.
2. The board member does not receive compensation for performing volunteer services and does not have an ownership interest or other financial interest in the entity, facility, clinic, or provider group.
3. The clinical volunteer services are performed at the University of California or a nonprofit educational institution; a facility, clinic, or provider group operated by, or affiliated with, an academic medical center of either the University of California or a nonprofit educational institution; or a facility, clinic, or provider group operated by a state agency or county health system that does not directly contract with the office. (H&S Code, § 127501.10 (c) (4) (A-D)).

Compensation and financial interest for a health care professional who performs clinical volunteer services does not include either of the following:

1. A contribution to a professional liability insurance program made by the entity, facility, clinic, or provider group for the member or staff.
2. The provision of physical space, equipment, support staff, or other supports made by the entity, facility, clinic, or provider group for the member or staff necessary for the performance of clinical volunteer services (H&S Code, § 127501.10 (4)(E) (I-II)).

The board shall establish a Health Care Affordability Advisory Committee to provide input, including recommendations, to the board and the office on a range of areas, including, but not limited to, all of the following:

A statewide health care cost target and specific targets by health care sector and geographic region, methodology for setting cost targets and adjustment factors to modify cost targets when appropriate, definitions of health care sectors, benchmarks for primary care and behavioral health spending, statewide goals for the adoption of alternative payment models and standards, quality and equity metrics, standards to advance the stability of the health care workforce, and other areas requested by the board or the office.

The board shall appoint the members of the advisory committee. Appointments shall be made by a majority vote of the voting members of the board. When appointing members to the advisory committee, the board shall aim for broad representation, including, at a minimum, representatives of consumer and patient groups, payers, fully integrated delivery systems, hospitals, organized labor, health care workers, medical groups, physicians, and purchasers, and shall apply the same considerations of demonstrated knowledge, expertise, diversity, and personal experience.

One (1) shall be knowledgeable in ethnic history. (Pub. Resources Code § 5020.2(b)(2).)

One (1) shall be knowledgeable in folklife. (Pub. Resources Code § 5020.2(b)(3).)

Two (2) shall represent the public or possess expertise in fields of expertise the Governor deems necessary or desirable to enable the commission to carry out its responsibilities. (Pub. Resources Code § 5020.2(b)(4).)

Term: Four (4) years. (Pub. Resources Code § 5020.2(c).)

Receive and evaluate applications for registration of structures, sites, or places as historical landmarks or points of historical interest. The commission shall select and designate historical landmarks and points of historical interest that it determines meet the criteria in Public Resources Code section 5031(a). The commission shall maintain a register which identifies historical landmarks and points of historical interest by number and description. (Pub. Resources Code § 5020.4(a)(10).)

Recommend to the department the type of directional sign to be erected in connection with the registration of a point of historical interest. The commission shall consult with cities and counties in developing design and placement standards. These standards shall not prevent a city or county from implementing its own standards if they meet the minimum criteria established by the commission.

The HOPE for Children Trust Account Program Board would administer the program and the funds in alignment with the intent of the Legislature to create opportunities, economic autonomy, and hope, and to promote wealth and asset building for an eligible child and eligible youth to address California's record levels of inequality. (Welfare & Inst Code § 18997.5 (e)).

Become an endorser, surety, or obligor on investments by the board. (Welfare & Inst Code § 18997.5(c)).

The board and staff, including contracted administrators and consultants, shall discharge their duties as fiduciaries with respect to the HOPE trust accounts solely in the interest of the program enrollees as follows:

For the exclusive purposes of providing benefits to program enrollees and defraying reasonable expenses of administering the program.

By investing with the care, skill, prudence, and diligence under the circumstances then prevailing that a prudent person acting in a like capacity and familiar with those matters would use in the conduct of an enterprise of a like character and with like aims. (Welfare & Inst Code § 18997.5(d)).

The board, subject to its authority and fiduciary duty, and in consultation with the advisory workgroup established pursuant to Section 18997.54, shall administer the program and the funds appropriated for the program in alignment with

Purpose: To ensure the integrity, viability, and safety of the California horse racing industry by regulating parimutuel wagering for the protection of the public, promoting horse racing, breeding, and wagering opportunities, and fostering safe racing through the development and enforcement of track safety standards and regulations for the health and welfare of all participants.

Authority: Business & Professions Code §§ 19420 et seq.

Appointing Power: Governor (subject to Senate confirmation)

Number: Seven (7)

Special Considerations: Each member shall have been a resident of this State for two (2) years next preceding his appointment.
(Bus. & Prof. Code § 19422.)

Qualifications: A person is disqualified from membership on the board if the person, the person's spouse or any dependent child thereof:
(Bus. & Prof. Code § 19423.)

- Holds a financial interest in any horse racing track.
- Holds a financial interest or position of management with any business entity which conducts parimutuel horseracing.
- Holds a financial interest in a management or concession contract with any business entity which conducts pari-mutuel horse racing

In order to permit the full participation of horsemen and horsewomen who may be appointed to the board, the Legislature declares that the appointment of such persons is intended to represent and further the interests of horse owners and breeders pursuant to Bus. Prof. Code section 19401, and that such representation and furtherance will ultimately serve the public interest. (Bus. & Prof. Code § 19424.5.)

Term: Four (4) years, commencing at the expiration of the previous term. Vacancies shall be filled by the Governor for unexpired term.
(Bus. & Prof. Code § 19421.)

Term Limits: Each member shall be eligible for reappointment in the discretion of the Governor. (Bus. & Prof. Code § 19421.)

Grace Period: Sixty (60) days (Gov. Code § 1774.)

(Bus. & Prof. Code § 19425.)

Bond: Not stated in statute.

Oath: Government Code §§ 1360 – 1363.

Duties: Responsibilities of the board shall include, but not be limited to, all of the following: (Bus. & Prof. Code § 19440(a)(1-5).)

- Adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and parimutuel wagering.
- Administration and enforcement of all laws, rules, and regulations affecting horse racing and parimutuel wagering.
- Adjudication of controversies arising from the enforcement of those laws and regulations dealing with horse racing and parimutuel wagering.
- Licensing of each racing association and all persons, other than the public at large, who participate in a horse racing meeting with parimutuel wagering.
- Allocation of racing dates to qualified associations in accordance with law.

The board shall, if possible, designate at least one (1) steward at each track where a horse racing meeting is conducted who is a former jockey or at least one (1) steward at each track where a harness meeting is conducted who is a former driver. (Bus. & Prof. Code § 19442.2.)

An officer or employee of the agency shall not be employed by, hold any paid relation to, or have any financial interest in, any housing sponsor or any affordable housing financed or assisted under this part, provided that this prohibition shall not apply to a member of the board of directors who is not an employee of the agency. (Health & Safe Code § 50905(a).)

Qualifications: Governor shall select four (4) of the seven (7) appointees from the following categories: (Health & Saf. Code § 50902(b).)

- An elected official of a city or county engaged in the planning or implementation of a housing, housing-assistance, or housing-rehabilitation program.
- A person experienced in residential real estate in the savings and loan, mortgage banking, or commercial banking industry.
- A person experienced as a builder of residential housing.
- A person experience in organized labor in the residential construction industry.
- A person experienced in the management of rental or cooperative housing occupied by lower income households.
- A person experienced in manufactured housing finance and development.
- A person representing the public.

Not more than one (1) person from each category may serve on the board at any one (1) time, except that two (2) members may be appointed by the Governor to represent the public.

Governor shall also appoint two (2) members who are residents of rental or cooperative housing financed by the agency or who are persons experienced in counseling, assisting, or representing tenants. (Health & Saf. Code § 50902(c).)

At least one (1) of the members appointed by the Governor shall have specific knowledge of bonds and related financial instruments, interest rate swaps, and risk management.

Shall establish criteria for housing sponsors and qualified mortgage lenders, which shall be designed to assure the financial integrity of programs authorized by this division and which shall provide for effective implementation of the policies and purposes set forth in this part. The criteria shall take into account the differences between private and public institutions qualifying as housing sponsors and qualified mortgage lenders.
(Health & Saf. Code § 51062.)

- Meeting Frequency: Meetings of the Board shall be held at any place within or without the State of California which has been designated from time to time by the Board. Special meetings of the Board for any purpose of purposes may be called at any time by the Chair, President, Vice President, Secretary, or any two (2) directors.
(CHPC Bylaws Art. 3, Sec. 5-7.)
- Bond: Not stated in statute.
- Oath: Government Code §§ 1360 – 1363.
- Duties: Raise equity funds, from corporations or individuals, for housing and related facilities sponsored by nonprofit housing development corporations organized pursuant to state or federal law, primarily for the benefit of very low income or low-income households.
(Health & Saf. Code § 52560(a)(1).)
- Except as provided in Health & Safety Code § 52560(a)(5), where no local nonprofit housing development corporation exists, plan, initiate, and carry out the acquisition, rehabilitation, acquisition and rehabilitation, or construction of housing and related facilities pursuant to state or federal law, primarily for the benefit of very low income households or low-income households, only to the extent necessary to carry out the purposes of this chapter in raising equity capital. (Health & Saf. Code § 52560(a)(2).)
- Provide technical assistance to nonprofit corporations, public agencies, and private profit-motivated entities and individuals with respect to housing planning, financing, acquisition, rehabilitation, maintenance, or management to ensure continuation of the existing low-income or very low-income housing stock. The corporation may

Duties: enter into contracts with organizations or individuals receiving
(continued) technical assistance to provide for payment of services.
(Health & Saf. Code § 52560(a)(4).)

Acquire government subsidized multifamily housing and related facilities, occupied by low-income and very low income households, which are at risk of conversion to market rate housing, or other non low-income use, provided that the conditions set forth in subparagraph (A), (B), or (C), are met:

(Health & Saf. Code § 52560(a)(5)(A-C).)

- (A) There is no other priority purchaser, as defined in Section 231 of the federal Low Income Housing Preservation and Resident Homeownership Act of 1990 (Public Law 101-265) as it may from time to time be amended, in active negotiation with the owner of the housing at the end of the first 10 months of the sale period.
- (B) No priority purchaser has executed an agreement to purchase the housing within 12 months of the sale period of a priority purchaser cannot fulfill the terms of a purchase agreement.
- (C) There is no local nonprofit organization or public agency qualified purchaser, as defined in Section 241 of the Federal Housing and Community Development Act of 1987 (Public Law 100-242) as it may from time to time be amended.

In carrying out the purposes and objectives of Health & Safety Code section 52560(a), the corporation shall do both of the following: (Health & Saf. Code § 52560(c)(1-2).)

- Give priority to those housing developments which are having trouble attracting private capital at reasonable terms and conditions, including inner-city, rural, and small housing developments serving lower income households and very low income households.
- Seek to ensure that a maximum number of units shall be made available for occupancy by very low income households.

CALIFORNIA HUMANITIES, BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Purpose: Support public activities in the humanities in the State of California. Cal Humanities will develop programs and raise funds to support projects that fulfill the purpose of Cal Humanities.

Authority: Council for the Humanities Bylaws

Appointing Power: Governor – 6

Number: Not less than twenty-four (24) and no more than twenty-eight (28)

Special Considerations: Governor may appoint six (6) members provided that the number does not exceed twenty-five (25) percent of the total membership. (Bylaws Art. 6, § 4(b).)

Directors shall have demonstrated excellence in a field of academic, public or occupational life. Each Director shall serve as an individual, not as a representative of any person, agency, institution or special constituency other than the citizens of CA. (Bylaws Art. 6, § 4(a).)

Qualifications: Directors must be a resident of the State (CA) at the time of election. A Director, who during his/her term is no longer a resident of CA, shall not be disqualified; provided that no more than three (3) Directors shall not be residents of the State at any given time. (Bylaws Art. 6, § 4(a).)

Directors shall constitute an appropriate representation of academic and public constituencies, women and ethnic minorities, occupational groups, geographic area, and in other ways reflect the diverse academic and public communities in CA. (Bylaws Art. 6, § 4(a).)

Term: Three (3) years; and shall serve until replaced by a succeeding Governor. (Bylaws Art. 8, § 5(a).)

The term of any director elected to the board of the Federation of State Humanities Councils shall be automatically extended to coincide with the term on the Federation board. (Bylaws Art. 6, § 5(c).)

Term Limits: None stated.

Grace Period: Continues to serve until replacement has qualified. (Gov. Code, § 1302.)

- Compensation: None, except for actual and necessary expenses.
(Bylaws Art. 6, § 17.)
- Meeting Frequency: Regular meetings shall be held at various times within any calendar year as determined by the Board. (Bylaws Art. 6, § 8(a).)
- Oath: Government Code §§ 1360-1363.
- Duties: Each director shall perform his or her duties as a director including duties of any Board committee in good faith, in a manner the director believes to be in the best interests of the Council and with such cause, including reasonable inquiry, as an ordinary prudent person in a like position would use under similar circumstances.
(Bylaws Art. 6, § 7(a).)
