**David Cook**

David Cook, a resident of California, has applied for executive clemency.

On February 5, 1980, the Superior Court of California, County of San Francisco, sentenced Mr. Cook to three years of probation and 180 days in jail for the sale of a substance in lieu of a controlled substance. On December 14, 1995, the court sentenced Mr. Cook to three years of probation and one year in jail for grand theft.

Mr. Cook complied with the provisions of California Penal Code sections 4852.01 through 4852.22, which provide a procedure after completion of sentence to seek restoration of civic rights and responsibilities. On May 28, 2021, the Superior Court of California, County of Solano, granted Mr. Cook a Certificate of Rehabilitation on evidence that he has been living an upright life. By granting Mr. Cook's petition for a Certificate of Rehabilitation, the court has recommended that Mr. Cook be granted a pardon.

This act of clemency for Mr. Cook does not minimize or forgive his conduct or the harm it caused. It does recognize the work he has done since to transform himself.

By the laws of this state it is proper that I, as Governor of the State of California, give testimony that, by completion of his sentence and good conduct in the community, Mr. Cook merits this pardon.

**Alison Hesterly**

Alison Hesterly, a resident of California, has applied for executive clemency.

On November 15, 1996, the Superior Court of California, County of Los Angeles, sentenced Ms. Hesterly to three years of probation and two days in jail for theft of personal property. On July 25, 2002, the court sentenced Ms. Hesterly to three years of probation and 30 days in jail for possession of a controlled substance. On December 26, 2002, the court sentenced Ms. Hesterly to three years of probation for a hit and run causing property damage. On March 6, 2003, the court sentenced Ms. Hesterly to two years in prison for first degree burglary.

Ms. Hesterly submitted a formal application for executive clemency in the form of a gubernatorial pardon. She has provided evidence that she is living an upright life and has demonstrated her fitness for restoration of civic rights and responsibilities.

This act of clemency for Ms. Hesterly does not minimize or forgive her conduct or the harm it caused. It does recognize the work she has done since to transform herself and her subsequent service to California and the United States as a firefighter.

By the laws of this state it is proper that I, as Governor of the State of California, give testimony that, by completion of her sentence and good conduct in the community, Ms. Hesterly merits this pardon.

On November 18, 2022, the Superior Court of California, County of Sacramento, granted Ms. Horciza a Certificate of Rehabilitation on evidence that she has been living an upright life. By granting Ms. Horciza's petition for a Certificate of Rehabilitation, the court has recommended that Ms. Horciza be granted a pardon.

This act of clemency for Ms. Horciza does not minimize or forgive her conduct or the harm it caused. It does recognize the work she has done since to transform herself.

By the laws of this state it is proper that I, as Governor of the State of California, give testimony that, by completion of her sentence and good conduct in the community, Ms. Horciza merits this pardon.

**Shannan Alva McLaughlin**

Shannan Alva McLaughlin, a resident of California, has applied for executive clemency.

On April 25, 2003, the Superior Court of California, County of Contra Costa, sentenced Ms. McLaughlin to three years of probation for burglary and unauthorized use of another's identification to obtain credit. On January 7, 2005, the Superior Court of California, County of Alameda sentenced Ms. McLaughlin to five years of probation and 60 days in jail for second degree burglary, forging checks, passing a fictitious check, possession of identification to commit forgery, and obtaining credit using another's identification. On August 17, 2005, the Superior Court of California, County of Contra Costa, sentenced Ms. McLaughlin to two years of probation and 180 days in jail for second degree burglary, forging checks, possession of identification to commit forgery, obtaining credit using another's identification, and transportation of methamphetamine. On March 15, 2006, the court sentenced Ms. McLaughlin to three years of probation and 180 days in jail for second degree burglary and petty theft. The courts subsequently reduced all but the drug offense to misdemeanor convictions.

Ms. McLaughlin complied with the provisions of California Penal Code sections 4852.01 through 4852.22, which provide a procedure after completion of sentence to seek restoration of civic rights and responsibilities. On July 15, 2016, the Superior Court of California, County of Contra Costa, granted Ms. McLaughlin a Certificate of Rehabilitation on evidence that she has been living an upright life. By granting Ms. McLaughlin's petition for a Certificate of Rehabilitation, the court has recommended that Ms. McLaughlin be granted a pardon.

This act of clemency for Ms. McLaughlin does not minimize or forgive her conduct or the harm it caused. It does recognize the work she has done since to transform herself.

By the laws of this state it is proper that I, as Governor of the State of California, give testimony that, by completion of her sentence and good conduct in the community, Ms. McLaughlin merits this pardon.

**Somboon Phaymany**

Somboon Phaymany, a resident of California, has applied for executive clemency.

On October 21, 1997, the Superior Court of California, County of San Diego, sentenced Mr. Phaymany to 14 years to life for attempted murder, assault with a semi-automatic firearm, assault with a firearm, and conspiracy to commit assault with a firearm, plus two years of enhancements. He was 19 years old at the time of his crime.

Mr. Phaymany submitted a formal application for executive clemency in the form of a gubernatorial pardon. He has provided evidence that he is living an upright life and has demonstrated his fitness for restoration of civic rights and responsibilities.

This act of clemency for Mr. Phaymany does not minimize or forgive his conduct or the harm it caused. It does recognize the work he has done since to transform himself.

By the laws of this state it is proper that I, as Governor of the State of California, give testimony that, by completion of his sentence and good conduct in the community, Mr. Phaymany merits this pardon.
